Dear Sisters,

Did you watch any of the TV coverage of the Olympic Games? Did you marvel at the endurance, the commitment, the courage of the athletes? Were you encouraged or challenged when you saw the Paralympians overcome disability with determination and inner strength? Did you celebrate with them at their homecoming when their families and friends and supporters welcomed them home?

These Olympic Games were different to usual of course. 
In our communion liturgy we sometimes give thanks for this 'foretaste of the heavenly banquet prepared for all people.'

Editor's word:

I am your shield, your very great reward.

Abraham's life amazes me every time I read it, for certainly, he was a great man of God. Even though nowadays society does not promote humbleness anymore, as it is all about what you become, how much money you earn, what you have achieved, how you look, how your body matches the modelling requirements, how many likes you receive and how many shares you have, in God's world humbleness is still a virtue.

When God called Abraham out of Ur, Mesopotamia, He called him from a very prosperous, rich, fancy city into a humble trip on camels, to a country that was not revealed yet. Later, on the journey, the name was revealed to be Canaan. The Semitic root of this word means to be humble, which is very explicit. Imagine living in a country where you have everything, great infrastructure, great riches, your own estate, and being asked to leave it all behind and travel for months and months to an unknown, poor, unfancy place. I think you need to humble yourself a lot to do this.

But Abraham's story of humbleness continues because he trusted God more than anything, even though he had his flaws. When he arrives in Canaan, there is famine, then family problems begun with Sara, then with his nephew, Lot, and so on. But here something very interesting happens. Abraham asks Lot to part company with him to remain in a good relationship (Genesis 13: 19), but he does not demand any part of the land (land that was promised to him); he lets Lot choose. Of course, Lot takes the best part: Lot looked around and saw that the whole plain of the Jordan toward Zoar was well watered, like the garden of the LORD, like the land of Egypt... So Lot chose for himself the whole plain of the Jordan (13:10-12) Abraham is left with the desert area and, again, it seems that the blessing is passing by him.


Soon after, war breaks out in the Jordan Valley and the cities near which Lot settled are conquered by a coalition, and Lot is taken as a prisoner of war. At that moment, Abraham goes after him with an army and brings back all the war prisoners and the fortunes. His morality can be clearly seen following the victory, he was greeted by two personalities of the area. First is the king of Sodom, a city where people were particularly wicked, and he offered Abraham the prey

that was recovered, but Avram refuses: "With raised hand I have sworn an oath to the LORD, God Most High, Creator of heaven and earth, that I will accept nothing belonging to you... I will accept nothing" (14:22-24)

At the same time, he meets a local king, Melchizedek (meaning "righteous king"), and Abraham receives the blessing of this king from ancient Jerusalem, who was also "High Priest of the God Most High." In this situation, Abraham refused the material blessing of a sinful king and accepted the spiritual blessing of a righteous king.

Right after this episode, God spoke to Abraham and told him not to be afraid - though his fears were well-founded: a new coalition could be formed against him - and that He was "his shield and his very great reward" (Genesis 15:1), as if it was a huge divine gift given for his humbleness.

When you renounce your own comfort, riches, pride,; God Himself, the All Mighty One, the most caring one, the richest one, is your reward and your inheritance. That is most certainly a great deal.



LORD, you alone are my inheritance, my cup of blessing. You guard all that is mine. (Psalm 16:5, NLT) After this, the word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision: "Do not be afraid, Abram. I am your shield, your very great reward." (Genesis 15:1)

Methodist Women in Britain have been celebrating their 10th Anniversary this year.

Our Keynote Speaker for the weekend was Sister Imelda Poole MBE, who works with the



Mary Ward Loreto Foundation/Albanian Hope, to prevent human trafficking among young people in Albania. Imelda, a sister of the Institute of the Blessed Virgin Mary, works to address the root causes of trafficking, including poverty, and is involved with the rescue and rehabilitation of victims of trafficking. In her keynote addresses, Imelda shared some of her experiences and made us aware of the signs of a victim of trafficking. Workshops were held on the first afternoon by three organisations who work with

trafficked people – 'Hope for Justice', 'Stop the Traffic', and 'Railway Children'. They shared news of their work and activities.

On the Sunday morning, opening prayers and updates were led by the Helen Kim



Memorial Scholars Rachel Allison, Wanda Hogan, and Phoebe Parkin, the current Youth President. These were followed by a WFMUCW update by World President, Alison Judd. A Bible study followed by Louise Wilson, President of the British and Ireland Unit and worship was led by Hilary Evans, President of MWiB.

The Sunday afternoon was a celebration of our tenth anniversary, led by Hilary Evans, and featured a video celebrating the work of MWiB, a poem written by Hilary and the singing of two hymns, specially written for the occasion, by Hilary and Ruth Parrott, Vice President. For the grand finale each person provided themselves with a cake and a candle and we sang 'Happy Birthday'. This was followed by a firework display – on video of course!

We hope to continue our celebrations next year, 10 + 1 years, proving that we are 'Together, with Hope on the Way'.



Helen Kim Memorial Scholars are:

- aged between 18 and 30 years at the time of the World Federation World Assembly.
- committed members of a Methodist, United or Uniting Church.
- involved in women's issues and/or church work.
- young women who have shown leadership abilities.
- able to state ways in which they will be able

to share their newly acquired skills.

- nominated by a member of their local World Federation Unit; and
- endorsed by their Minister and the Unit President.

The Helen Kim Memorial Scholarship is now open for applications. Please contact the World Secretary for an application form. Please ensure all applications are submitted to your Area Officers by the 31st October 2021.

The World Officers are currently working on how best to implement the Helen Kim Programme given that the 14th World Assembly will be conducted completely online.

Elizabeth Kissack – a life well lived



WFMUCW was organized with a vision and purpose: to know Christ and to make Him known. Faithful Women elected to the positions of responsibility held on and passed on the Baton of Faith to other faithful women. We praise God for such women. Their faith journey is inspiring and they have left their footprints on the sands of time.

We remember one such person – Elizabeth Kissack – the 9th President of the World Federation of Methodist Church Women (1976- 1981). She passed on to glory in the Isle of Man in June 2021 at the age of 105 years. During her tenure as President, she had a vision to enable the World Federation to become an NGO at the United Nations which was endorsed at the World Assembly in 1981.

Dr Oknah Kim Lah – a great leader

The World Federation sisterhood is giving God thanks for the long and distinguished life of one of their inspirational leaders, Dr Oknah Kim Lah, who died on 30 August, 2021.

She was born on September 27, 1918 in Goseong-gun, Gangwon-do, Republic of Korea. Oknah Kim was educated at Toshisha Women's University in Japan and earned her Master's degree in Theology from Yonsei University.

She served as President of the Korean Methodist Women's Society Christian Service from



1967 to 1974. From 1974 to 1981 she served as President of the World Federation of Methodist Uniting Church Women of East Asia area. She later served as President of the World Federation of Methodist Uniting Church Women from 1981 to 1986. Kakdang Welfare Foundation training centre was established by Oknah after she had retired from her World Federation leadership role in 1986.

The President of the World Methodist Council Rev J C Park said: 'Many Korean citizens as well as Korean Methodists have mourned her death with great admiration for her enormous service for the women, the youth and the elderly people in Korea.'

A Personal Tribute to Oknah Kim Lah by Ann Connan

One of the first issues I raised with my new Executive after my installation as World President in 2011 was the Federation Hymn. This was difficult to sing, and I suggested we find a new tune. I needed to contact Oknah Kim Lah, World President from 1981-1986, who was the author of the words. I had never met Oknah, but had read and heard of her, and I was in awe. During her Presidency, the Federation received consultative status as an NGO member of the United Nations Economic and Social Council, and the History of

the Federation was published. So, I wrote to her with my idea of a new tune. She gave me her blessing to change whatever I liked! The result was a slight change in the words and a new tune - easily sung. I loved her for her generosity.

In 2013 I attended the World Council of Churches Assembly in Busan, Korea, with East Asia President Laureen Ong. Oknah knew I was there and arranged for her friend, Haesun, to bring her from to meet me. I was overwhelmed that this Past President, whom I respected so much, wanted to meet me. We sat in the little café, Oknah holding my hand tightly, and chatted about our times as Presidents. Mine was fraught with difficulties

because of financial problems and Oknah was sympathetic. She told of always travelling First Class to the more than 60 countries she visited because her husband was a generous businessman and paid! And of doing lots of shopping after each meeting: "My husband will pay to get it home!" Oknah was then in her 90s, her grooming had her in her 70s, and she giggled like a 30-year-old!

Next morning after worship it was suggested she leave. "Oh, no," said Oknah, "I'm going to Bible Study with Ann". And she did - still holding my hand!

We continued to write and send greetings to each other until just before her death at almost 103

years of age. She shared with me her work in Korea after her time serving the Federation. The Kakdang Social Welfare Foundation had four arms: Volunteer Training, Hospice Care Training, Death Education, and Global Cultural Education. Korea honored her for this work because she was a truly remarkable woman. But to me she was a warm, generous friend, genuinely interested in me.

We give thanks to God for Oknah's commitment to the work of the Federation and rejoice that she is now in God's welcoming arms.
