### Editor's word:

### DARE Sometimes craziness is all that is needed.

Remember Noah: imagine building an ark in an area where rain hardly ever falls. People were passing by, asking questions, and Noah kept working on the ark, explaining to people that a great rain will soon come. The situation was unimaginable and, of course, people mocked him, and they thought he was crazy. But it was exactly this craziness brought about the deliverance of humanity. The rain came, and the ark was the salvation, not only of humans, but of the animals also.

A modern-day Noah is Amir Peretz, an Israeli politician who proposed the missile defense system. This was in the years 2000, when the rockets fired into Israel were very few, causing literally one death per year. This situation could not justify spending huge amounts of money on the system. Everybody mocked him - the people, the politicians – and he was ridiculed in massmedia photos, slandered, and isolated in politics. What military knowledge can he have if he is a politician? Why should anyone invest in such an expensive system while the offence is low and almost no one dies?


He faced down the skeptics and continue to push for the development of the missile defense system, the well-known Iron Dome. Of course, he looked like a madman in the eyes of the Israelis. But not for long. Now we know something they could not have imagined: the thousands and thousands of rockets that have rained down on Israel since then. Israel would have been destroyed and thousand of people would have lost their lives if there was no man called Amir Peretz, if he had bowed his head down when he was criticized, and if they had not built the Iron Dome, a modern-day ark for the Jewish people. The system is designed to

intercept and destroy short-range rockets and artillery shells fired from distances of 4 to 70 kilometers away, whose trajectory would take them to an Israeli populated area.

Dare to do what God tells you to do. You never know what deliverance the 'ark' you are building will bring to society. Dare to be a Noah, no matter what people think of you.

And, as Christmas approaches, do not forget that Noah and his saving ark is an image of Christ and His saving Death. Jesus dared to leave everything, to be born as a baby, to live on this Earth, to minister and to lose Himself in order to save us all. We rejoice for His birth, but we cannot separate this event from the reason why He came. Birth and death intertwine and bring us the Good News. He dared - and He gives you strength to dare to change the world you live in. May God give you joy, peace and boldness!

normality and enjoy all the postponed events planned for the year ahead!



### The 14th World Assembly of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women

Theme: 'Go and bear fruit - fruit that will last'.

**Date:** 9th – 14th August 2022

**Venue:** ONLINE registration via Humanitix

(date to be announced)

The World Assembly normally occurs every five years. It is a gathering of women from more than 70 nations, including around 80 official World, Area and Unit delegates, but with many others attending at their own expense because they value the opportunity to meet with their Federation sisters from other parts of the world. However, this Assembly will be different. Aware that the global pandemic is severely restricting travel, the bold decision was made by the World Executive to hold our 14th World Assembly in 2022 as a virtual, online event.

The theme for 2022-2026, that will be launched at our Assembly, is taken from the words of Jesus recorded in John 15, in which He describes Himself as the true vine and his disciples as the branches, urging us to abide in Him so that we can be effective in our service. He warns, 'Apart from me you can do nothing' (verse 5). Yet, following the example of Jesus to love one another, we become not

just servants, but friends of Jesus, appointed to 'go and bear fruit – fruit that will last' (John 15:16). Therefore, our theme is a call to spirituality, productivity, and sustainability.

Our online Assembly will be streamed live over several days, and registration will be open with a small fee of US\$50 to help cover our costs. Interpretation into several languages will be available. It would also be possible for women to register individually but gather as a group in a venue with internet. Separate business meetings will be open to those with voting rights as participants. Workshops will be pre-recorded as video presentations, with suggestions for group discussion.

Our emblem, the Tree of Life, bears twelve fruits, as described in Revelation 22:2. During the last 20 years we have used the United Nations Goals as the basis for our priority actions. We aim to bear fruit in our work in health, education, alleviating poverty and

hunger, addressing gender-based violence and social injustice, and learning to care for creation. In Area Seminars during this quinquennium we have heard about the concerns facing women today. These topics will inform us as we choose our workshops.

Twelve workshops will address the following issues:

- Reducing Poverty (SDG1) through skills training and income generating initiatives.
- Gender Equality (SDG5)

  communication, and
  technology as well as
  access to education in
  schools and colleges.
- Health and Well-being (SDG3) of body, mind, and spirit, including music, prayer, and nutrition.

- Eliminating Violence (SDG16) against women in the home and in wider areas of conflict.
- Care for Creation (SDG13)- recycling, reducing, restoring, planting, growing, to combat climate change.

Our Assembly will also include:

- **Daily worship**, in a variety of styles, supported by our music director, Rev Amelia Koh-Butler (U C Australia).
- **Bible study**, led by Jill Baker (Methodist Church in Britain).
- Inspirational speakers including Amanda Khozi Mukwashi, currently CEO of Christian Aid.
- **Presentations** from the nine Areas, United Nations representatives, and Helen Kim Memorial Scholars.
- Creation of an Action plan based on the workshop topics.
- Commissioning service:

- Business meetings for voting delegates and elections of new World Officers for 2022-2026.

The end of September each year is the time when we, as United Methodist Women in Hungary, get together. This year we met with an especially great joy, because we must admit that nowadays having a live retreat (not online) is truly a gift from God. We had our good old members with us, but we have welcomed brand new participants, too: altogether 54 lovely ladies and some men too, as you can see in the picture. Every year this is our most important meeting. Organizing such a Seminar is not easy, and we are exhausted by the end, but at the same time, it gives us more and more joy and satisfaction; it is always a huge ocean of blessings.

The story of Martha and Mary from Luke 10, the evening spent at the house of Zacchaeus, the disciples of Emmaus, or the Last Supper – what do these stories from the Bible have in common? Yes! That's it! They are all stories where the loving God is sitting at the table, and He is having a meal with different people. This was actually the title for our women's weekend: "Having a meal with Jesus". Do you like to sit down and drink some tea or eat a piece of cake with your family? Do you often share a dinner with your friends, with your loved ones? How do you do that? Who do you invite for dinner? These were some of the questions we discussed, and we rejoiced about the fact that Jesus is ready to have table-fellowship with all kinds of people. My heart was touched by the story of the woman from Luke 7:36-50, the sinful one that anointed Jesus with expensive oil. Sometimes I feel that when I serve Christ, I botched it up, and I am not very well prepared, or what I do is not a nice performance. Well, the woman in the story did something shocking, and she felt embarrassed maybe, or she muddled, but all she did meant a lot

to the Savior. We still talk about her, as it is written in the Gospel. So, dear Sisters, be encouraged: if you offer something to Christ, if you do something for Him, He looks at your heart, and not at the performance.

### EMMANUEL – God with us

Christmas is a time of joy and peace. The word Christmas is all about love. God so loved the world that He gave His only Son Jesus Christ. He was given to die for us on the cross, to redeem us from sin, and to give us salvation to attain eternal life. Isaiah 9:6 says, "For a child has been born for us, a son given to us: authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor,

Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Matthew 1:23 says, "They shall name him Emmanuel, which means, 'God is with us'."

Yes friends, God is with us. To many, December means Christmas. December brings holidays, celebration, good food, decorations, presents, new clothes, Santa Claus, caroling, candlelight service, Christmas service etc. But all these are in vain, if we do not experience the joy that comes from knowing that our sins are forgiven because of Jesus, and that He is with us.
