






What is the difference in climate impacts between 1.5°C and 2°C of warming?


▶ **Severe climate impacts** with 1.5 degrees of warming, and the effects get significantly worse with 2 degrees.





What is the difference in climate impacts between 1.5°C and 2°C of warming?


▶ **Severe climate impacts** with 1.5 degrees of warming, and the effects get significantly worse with 2 degrees.



Global primary energy consumption by source




Primary energy is calculated based on the 'substitution method' which takes account of the inefficiencies in fossil fuel production by converting non-fossil energy into the energy inputs required if they had the same conversion losses as fossil fuels.

▶ The U.S., European Union, and China are the top emitters in terms of cumulative emissions during 1850 and 2018.







As United Methodist Women, we urge Congress to address the pandemic and climate crisis by enacting a recovery package that includes infrastructure and energy legislation that prioritizes climate justice that is centered on racial, economic and gender justice.

- Enact economy-wide targets and strategies for reaching 70 percent renewable energy by 2030 and 100 percent by 2050, based on 2010 levels.
- Enact legislation that modernizes crumbling infrastructure and that supports the decarbonization of transportation.
- Enact legislation that supports a just transition for disproportionately impacted workers and communities.





United Methodist Women Members Share Hopes Regarding President Biden's Virtual Climate Summit and Nationally Determined Contributions

NEW YORK – Following President Joe Biden's virtual climate summit on April 22 and 23, where he set Nationally Determined Contributions, several members of United Methodist Women expressed their hopes for an equitable transition to renewable energy. Their comments, highlighted below, come just days after the organization held virtual legislative advocacy days where over 300 United Methodist Women leaders and friends from 40 states had over 80 Congressional visits across party lines and urged Congress to take

"The impact of climate change effects ALL of us and we must all urgently act to reduce carbon emissions," said Jana Jones from Centennial, Colorado and United Methodist Women national director. "This is a shared individual, corporate, and government responsibility. We need Congress to enact legislation that moves our country to use 100% renewable energy, move to a clean transportation system and provide a just transition to these goals which will impact workers and frontline, marginalized communities.



"These issues are important for the health of our country and by acting on them Congress shows their concern for their constituents," said Elizabeth Bailes of Ravenswood, West Virginia. She is a United Methodist Women social action coordinator for the West Virginia Conference of UMW.







that REDUCE OUR CARBON FOOTPRINT

Offer carpooling, choose venues with public transportation, turn down the air-conditioning and heat and look for venues that use renewable energy.

that MINIMIZE PAPER USE

Intentionally Plans Events

> Limit handouts, use double-sided printouts and choose chlorine-process-free and recycled-content paper. Minimize use of napkins and other paper products.





The production and use of paper has adverse effects on the environment. Deforestation contributes to climate change. Pulp mills contribute to pollution of air, water and land. Discarded paper accounts for about 35 percent of municipal solid waste (before recycling). Paper recycling can be a source of pollution due to the sludge produced during de-inking.

that REDUCE TOXINS

Avoid using petroleum-based products whenever possible, and avoid toxic cleaning products and lawncare products. Reduce your energy use.






Each year, more than 6 billion pounds of cleaning products and 450 billion pounds of paper products are used to clean our indoor environments.

that REDUCE WATER USE

Be aware when you're purchasing goods and services that all extraction, manufacturing and agriculture takes water. Ask if venues have low-flow showers and toilets. Ask facilities not to automatically fill water glasses and inquire about their towel-reuse policies.

The water it takes to produce the average American diet alone approximately 1,000 gallons per person per day-is more than the global average water footprint of 900 gallons per person per day for diet, household use, transportation, energy and the consumption of material goods. One piece of paper takes 3 gallons of water to manufacture.


The Next Generation Rises
