# President's letter

## Things are hotting up!

It is said that the favourite topic of conversation for British people is the weather. Well, in the UK in July we experienced higher temperatures than ever before (38.7° C in Cambridge) and also a huge amount of rainfall leading to severe flooding in some areas. A reservoir damn in Derbyshire was in danger of collapse due to heavy rain and many residents of a nearby town temporarily evacuated their homes.

The recent extremes of weather in the UK and elsewhere in the world have been explained in terms of climate change and global warming. Leading scientists warn of worsening climatic conditions, but some are still dismissed as scaremongers. The Swedish schoolgirl Greta Thunberg has mobilised young people to challenge the authorities to take urgent action before it is too late. We are being urged to re-think our reliance on plastics and fossil fuels that are damaging our environment.

At the Methodist Conference in Birmingham in the first week of July, delegates were urged to go back to their churches and take action. The Conference encouraged its members and churches to reduce plastic pollution, and for church cafés to consider signing up to a refill scheme, offering free refills for water bottles. However, I am mindful that in countries where there is little fresh water fit for drinking, bottled water offers a life-giving

essential. What is the answer? How can we better care for our world – God's beautiful creation – of which we are stewards?

A Rocha International runs workshops in conservation and environmental education in many parts of the world. An example on their website [www.arocha.org/en](http://www.arocha.org/en) describes a Ugandan Primary School “where pupils have created an orchard, nursery beds and medicinal garden. They are growing bananas and maize and growing their vegetables in sacks where space is limited.” Meanwhile the Church of South India, one of the first in India

to promote environmental concerns, has held its 5th International Eco-Conference: Greening the Global for Sustainable Living. In Ethiopia, 350 million trees have been planted in one day, part of an initiative to restore forests and combat climate change. You will know of other examples of positive action in your own countries.



# Be holy, for I am holy

## Is all *hevel*?

At first view the book of Ecclesiastes is quite surprising, if not depressing. The teacher presented in the book has a very pessimistic view of the world. For him, everything – gathering riches, having pleasures, gaining wisdom and knowledge, and so on – is *hevel*: futile, vanity, a chasing after the wind. Everything is *hevel* because even though these things should make us feel good and enable us to have a good life, they are no guarantee that we will have the life we want. Why? Because we cannot control our lives. Time takes our life away; injustice exists, and death also. We cannot control the repercussions of the negative things in our life. The book continues in this way until the end – but the end is quite different. There is one thing that is not *hevel*: the fear of God.

This does not refer to anxiety, but to the reverence one has for Him, and to the keeping of His commandments: Now all has been heard; here is the conclusion of the matter: Fear God and keep his commandments, for this is the duty of all mankind. For God will bring every deed into judgment, including every hidden thing, whether it is good or evil. (Ecclesiastes 12:13-14)

And this verse made me realize that the judgement of the God is NOT something we should be afraid of, but rather something that should make us TRUST Him when our life is stolen, and injustice occurs. In the negative circumstances of life, the having hope for God's judgement is vital. Even though now bad people prosper, a day will come when the saints will prosper. Even though now is not exactly how I wish it would be, a day will come when tears and dissatisfaction will be no more.

So, when all is *hevel* – and it is true, that riches and

career and knowledge are nothing without Him – the reverence one has for Him and the trust we have in Him remain and should give us enough power to move forward.


This makes me think of the communist era: I was born in a communist country, but Romania was not one of the communist countries, it was the one with the most repressive regime. I wish I could tell you I had a beautiful childhood, but I cannot say that. We lived in continuous fear: Christians were persecuted and killed, churches were destroyed, people died of hunger, believers were kicked out of their jobs because of their faith, they were tortured, put in prison and so on. Still, they continued to be Christians and continued to believe in a God of love, because many times what we experienced here was *hevel* (and the Hebrew word has another meaning: vapor – something that will disappear, will go away), but God remains forever. And trust me – or if you do not trust me, go and search for testimonies from the

Communist era – they could feel God's love and care for them, better than we can feel Him now, in a time of peace.

They were not forgotten by God: sometimes their torturer became a believer; sometimes a package of food arrived from the UK or USA or some other country and they could feed themselves for several days more; sometimes God hid from the police a car carrying Christian literature (Christian literature was

forbidden and the one caught smuggling it into the country earned the death penalty); sometimes a prison inmate would share the last piece of bread with another one and, despite the persecution, Christianity was spreading. Those were “stones of remembrance”, that God is here and He is in action, on the not-so-easy-Christian-path.

For our life and momentary troubles are achieving for us an eternal glory that far outweighs them all. So we fix our eyes not on what is seen, but on what is unseen, since what is seen is temporary, but what is unseen is eternal. (2 Corinthians 4:17-18)

## Thursdays in Black



Germany has a strong Thursdays in Black Campaign that is promoted with the Kirchentag (German Protestant church day festival) occasion. One of the strong promoters of the event is Bishop Rosemarie Wenner of the World Methodist Council. The message is that there should be no space for rape and violence in our world. The campaign includes stories, music, and other activities. During the event, the World Council of Churches (WCC) organizes a plenary on how sexual violence is a part of everyday culture – in songs, media and conversations. Announcement: Communities and individuals everywhere are invited to make a powerful,

international statement of their commitment to end rape and violence through contributing to a large quilted tapestry exhibit being developed by the World Council of Churches. The tapestry is intended to reflect a waterfall with messages and images from around the world. It will be displayed in 2020 at the Ecumenical Centre in Geneva and at major events and will continue to be expanded up to the WCC Assembly in 2021.

Sayri Marc, President of the Dominican Church Executive Committee, and Carmen Celis Martinez, who spoke about focusing on Christ. The afternoon included recreational time and the evening a concert with different singers and a Worship Group of the Evangelical Church of San Cristóbal. The third day began with a devotion about 'Chosen Women' lead by Leila and continued with different

In the afternoon there was a leaders' meeting and a special training session with the President in which the emphasis was on the importance of the World Federation and of being a member country.
